Post-Custody Accommodation

Background

- At the federal level there is a plan in place for post-custody accommodation. The accommodation plan includes access to halfway houses or transitional housing (long or short term).
- At the provincial level, there is no such plan in place. At most, offenders will receive a list of shelters or hostels in which they can seek accommodation.
- This project focused on how organizations across the Haliburton Kawartha Pine Ridge (HKPR) region, have addressed the needs for post-incarceration accommodation.

Research Questions

- 1. How have agencies across the region that work with ex-offenders and those recently released addressed the housing needs of this population?
- 2. What services would front-line agencies like to see to meet the needs of this population?
- What challenges do agencies encounter in meeting the housing needs of this population?
- What types of support do local agencies see as being necessary?
- 5. What post-incarceration accommodation programs exist elsewhere?
- 6. What is the existing best practice in post-incarceration accommodation?

Methodology


- Grey literature review of best practice, post-incarceration accommodation programs and accommodation planning at the federal level
- Surveys distributed to organizations within the HKPR region; which included Lindsay, Haliburton, Peterborough and Northumberland County
